- 1. I have been given the response from XY Police. Does it make sense to you?
- 2. Are those not matters for an MP? If not, why did Citizens Advice think they are?
- (i) And may matters for an MP be defined?
- 3. Are they not matters for the police? If not, why did Chief Constable A think they were (before more offences were committed)?
- (i) Why were the cases of Ms Letby and Mr Paterson (the oncologist) matters for the police?
- (ii) When did corruption cease to be a matter for the police?
- (iii) When did battery, assault and mistreatment of a patient cease to be matters for the police?
- (iv) When did unlawful interception of a person's communications cease to be a matter for the police?
- 4. I would like first your answers to those questions and then the police's answers to them.
- (i) Your answers are required because:
- (a) I would like your opinion on whether I have been reasonable in putting these matters to the police and to the local MP.
- (b) Because of the way it is conducting itself, I am starting to think the police is involved in the Campaign. By answering these questions, you might persuade me not to take that view, if it is wrong or unreasonable. It is within your brief to assist me in my efforts not to arrive at such conclusions, where they would be unreasonable.

- 5. Please inform the police that, by forbidding me from communicating with the local MP:
- (i) it has taken from me the right to be represented in Parliament,
- (ii) it renders Parliament deaf and blind to matters I might bring to it's [sic] attention.
- (a) Where I would have information that Parliament must have if it is effectively to perform its duties, this would mean the police is impeding the work of Parliament: it is preventing information from reaching Parliament.
- 6. Please also inform the police that I consider these actions and responses to have been taken and made by the Chief Constable.
- 7. Finally, please have the police accept a telephone call from me to discuss these matters.
- (i) If the police says it does not want to give me the opportunity to ask more questions, tell it that I would like to know why it fears the sort of questions I have put to it?
- 8. Please tell the police that, in the spirit of helpful friendliness, I warn it that, by her response, the Chief Constable may be restricting the scope of police activities, rejecting responsibilities assigned to it by the Government, expected of it by the public, and which public safety requires it to meet.
- (i) Please ask the Chief Constable to reflect soberly on the lessons of [excised: previous misconduct cases of that police force] cases.
- (a) Please inform the Chief Constable I advise her that this country is policed by consent and that becomes difficult if the public loses faith in the police.
